With steadfast support and love, Dr. Abelaine Venida Tablizo, a Miriam College alumna, has undeniably touched many hearts through her outstanding service in raising awareness about leprosy and striving to eliminate this neglected disease worldwide. Her exceptional advocacy continues to make a difference for people battling leprosy in the Philippines. Dr. Tablizo has been working tirelessly for thirteen years, serving as the President of Rizal Dermatology Services, Training, and Research Inc., fulfilling duties as the head of the Leprosy Unit of the Rizal Medical Center, and continuing to inaugurate the 'Hansen's Disease (HD) club, with hundreds of HD patient club members in her first year of residency.

Dr. Tablizo continues to work on finding hope for this neglected bacterial infection by collaborating with the Department of Health, as they aim

to eliminate leprosy by 2030. Moreover, it is noted to be an unusual disease with stigma due to its tie to religion, perceiving the symbol as pernicious. This stigma casts down the vital role of seeking correct medical care, leading to the development of physical, psychological, and social disabilities and debilitation for patients with leprosy.

Although it has been strenuous for them to untangle this crisis, her endeavor is still to provide assistance by training healthcare workers nationwide pertaining to its diagnosis, management, and clinical pathways. Her objective as a doctor has consistently been to ensure that patients receive proper care and supervision.

Dr. Tablizo embodies what a true Knoller is all about and how she made an impact, bringing Miriam College pride by showing kindness and goodness in her work as a doctor and a mother of four. One of her experiences that underscored her career was representing our country at the Philippine Centennial celebration in Alberta, Canada during her fourth year of high school, which deepened her perception of life and how we can be an inspiration to others and flourish.

She believes that God is the center of everything in life. Her hope is to encourage Knollers to believe that pouring your heart with full dedication, perseverance, compassion, and love is a way to prosper, as it will not just allow us to attain goals, but to reach the fullest potential of happiness and contentment. Moreover, she emphasizes that finding purpose in life is essential for living it to the fullest.

Their dedication and diplomatic finesse did not go unnoticed, as they were also awarded the Slanczka Achievement Certificate during the Diplomat's Banquet for their outstanding academic performance, diplomatic skills, and cooperative spirit throughout the conference.

The MUNFW experience provided these students with a platform to engage in meaningful debates, collaborate on global challenges, and enhance their public speaking, negotiation, and research skills. She reminded them that mistakes are part of the human experience but should not deter one from pursuing dreams and aspirations. Overall, her message resonated deeply with the graduating class, inspiring them to trust in themselves, their journey, and their faith as they embark on new endeavors.

MCHS GRADUATION 2024 SPEECH MS. MARIA PAULINA E. DEL MONTE MIRIAM COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL 2007

It feels so good to be back in my second home.

The first time I was on this stage, I was a star — that was literally my role: a "bituin" dancing "Kumukutikutitap" in our CSC play. But today I am marking another milestone with you: my firstever commencement speech.

I never made a speech when I was a student. I was never a valedictorian, or a salutatorian. I was not even in the top 10, or the top 20, or the top 30, or the top 50, not even the top 100. In fact, I was top 244.5 out of 366 students of the Miriam College High School class of 2007. That means I was right smack in the middle of the bell curve, where, realistically, most of you ladies also are (no shade to the top students), and that I was average. So let me tell you now that: **Being average is not a life sentence.** Can you say that with me? **Being average is not a life sentence.** One more time and louder: **Being average is not a life sentence.**

I want you to really feel that. Because today seems like an ending, but it's really another beginning and another chance for a reinvention. I stand in front of you today, this top 244.5 student of batch 2007, to tell you how I went from Top 244 to a Woman of Influence in 2024. Here's the first step:

1. EMPOWER YOURSELF FIRST

You see, in high school, as in grade school, and even in college, I had persistent depressive disorder, or depression. I only learned about this when I turned 22, by accident, after a routine psychological test. That diagnosis, and the succeeding treatment-a balancing act of therapy, medication, sunlight, healthy food, proper sleep, etc. etc.—became pivotal to my reinvention. I was in high school at a time when mental health was still taboo. Nobody knew the symptoms, and even I didn't think I had resembled someone who was mentally ill. I didn't know I had depression, nor did the people around me, but it manifested in my grades, in my underperformance, in my preference to be on the phone with my friends or on the internet instead of being present. Because depression is the leading cause of disability, I was essentially disabled from grade school until college, and only when I got the proper treatment was I able to turn my life around. You cannot show up if you are not well. You cannot reach your full potential unless you are not your full self. You need to be well to do great things, and you cannot accomplish any of those great things if you are not okay. You have to EMPOWER YOURSELF FIRST ALL OF US HAVE MENTAL HEALTH, the same way that we have our physical health, oral health, etc. If you think you need help, reach out. If you feel burnt out, pause. If you are in an environment that is hurting you, leave. One of the things that affects our mental health is our insecurities. I learned from my PCOS nutritionist Audee Sunga-Berces that the voices we hear in our heads are likely the voices of other people. "You are not pretty enough." "You're fat." "You're not good enough." These are statements we heard from others that we listened to, that we acknowledged, and we've ingrained in our system.



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Let me tell you this: **You dictate your own value.** Let me say that again: **YOU. Dictate. Your Own. Value.** That's why the first person you need to empower is yourself. Because you will never be able to empower others if you are not empowered yourself.

Did you know that according to a Harvard study: "Men apply for a job when they meet only 60% of the qualifications, but women apply only if they meet 100% of them"? There is a big difference between **confidence** and **competence**. This is why, as a communication consultant and through my Instagram, I help people, especially women, build confidence in communicating, because sometimes, even if they are competent, they get passed over by people who are not competent but are over-confident.

In a way, MC has protected you from toxic masculinity by giving you a kind of education that is empowering and liberating. But when you leave the gates of MC, you are left to your own devices. In my first semester in UP, one thing I noticed was when our professors would ask us to move our chairs to the side, only the boys carried the chairs, and the girls were being "Disney princesses". That was a total contrast from my MC upbringing – where we lift chairs and tables and all sorts of things because no one else was gonna do it for us. Even us girls can do the heavy lifting. In MC, because all of us were girls, we experienced being president, being team captain, being leaders – it's very Barbieland. We are taught that we can do ANYTHING and that's very empowering. But when you go out in the real, patriarchal world, you are gonna meet toxic Kens. Last week, I was at GCash event with Department of Trade Industry Undersecretary Rafaelita Aldaba, who said: "When it comes to leaders, the secretary is male, but our undersecretaries are mostly female. There are some negotiations, like in the Muslim countries, where you need a secretary who is a male." But I'm NOT going to say "go girl," "be better than boys", that's not the point. Just excel – period. But at that same event, we had Michelle Alarcon, President of Analytics and AI Association of the Philippines who said: Who creates opportunities? It's not males, it's not females, it's LEADERS. Leaders create the opportunities. So women, you have to get that slot. To be able to lead, you have to excel first. When you actually excel in the game, you can change the rules." This leads me to the second step...

2. CHAMPION WOMEN.

Note the word: CHAMPION. I'm not only simply saying: mentor women, support women, inspire women, not even empower women. **CHAMPION** WOMEN.

So the UN Women gig is an opportunity that was opened for me by [slide: Me and Rissa] UN Women Champion Rissa Mananquil Trillo, who I met via Instagram. She was one of my first followers, but she had already been a role model since I always saw her on TV as a child. Rissa taught me by example how to champion other women.



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She endorsed me for the social media consultant role at UN Women, I applied, and when I got in, she also took it upon herself to give me an informal orientation. Then in February, before Women's Month, she gathered other women champions for dinner which allowed me to meet other women who I've also recently been collaborating with.

Another champion is Myrza Sison, she was the founding editor of Cosmopolitan Philippines, my IDOL growing up, who I had the chance to meet through Instagram. When my account was only three days old, Myrza came across it, and sent me a message that she wished I was her writer when she was still in Cosmo! But Myrza's support has been super important because she also introduces me to people who can open doors for me. From Myrza: "We do not need to compete. We can collaborate.", I also learned this quote: "COLLABORATION, not COMPETITION." I remember hearing this also in MC — in a sense that I was taught to be competitive but also helping other people up with you, not bringing them down.

We live in a world where women are pitted against each other, but we do not need to be better or prettier or smarter. We can all work together. The men have their "old boys club", their "compadre system". If they need a new supplier, or they need to hire someone, they will turn to their friends or their friend's sons. We also have to have something like that where we allow our sisters to be given a chance. So if later on, you're going to hire a caterer, or a photographer, or if you need giveaways, HIRE A WOMAN. BUY FROM A WOMAN-LED BUSINESS. Because that's how you can boost women's economic empowerment.

Now I want you to look at the person beside you — pick a partner — and say this "I will champion you." Believe it or not, in this batch there is a future CEO, a future President. I want you girls to promise that you will champion other women. From this batch, from another batch, from another school. Because when you work with other people, our chances of sparking massive change multiplies. And this leads me to my last step:

3. SERVE THE PEOPLE

Let's be honest. You are here at this school because you have some level of privilege. Even if you are a scholar, even if you come from a humble background, you still have some privilege that's why you're here. Do not underestimate your power and privilege. Use it for good.

In my last year here, I learned from "Mga Ibong Mandaragit" that farmers only got a measly percentage of profits versus the landowners. And I remember Sir Dennis asking us if you were in the position of the landowner, how much percentage would you give the farmers? And our idealistic selves answered 50%.



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I won't forget what he said next: "Tignan natin pagtanda niyo kung anong gagawin nyo." So Sir Castro, although I do not own a farm, I can say in my own way as someone who is "nagpapa-sweldo", I can say that I have been fair.

And I know in the future, you ladies will also be in a position where you can decide how much money someone will make, or what opportunities you can open for others. And I hope you can come back to what you learned here in Miriam which is SOCIAL JUSTICE.

Whatever your calling is, wherever life will take you after today, never lose sight of you moral compass — for truth, peace, justice and integrity of creation. There are so many causes in this world, and while you cannot do EVERYTHING, you can do something — even if you're average now. And even if you're above average or below average. You have the power because you are not alone. There are literally hundreds of you here, and the opportunities in the world are infinite. So before I end this speech, may I ask you to repeat the three steps?

Ten or 20 years from now, I hope one of you will also be on this stage. So congratulations, batch 2024.Today is your own [slide: How it started] "How it started". Your future is still a blank space. I'm excited to see where you're going.

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MCGS GRADUATION 2024 SPEECH MS. GAIL VILLANUEVA

Good morning, everyone! It is truly an honor and a privilege to be part of such an important milestone in the academic life of our graduates. To be honest, I still can't believe I've been asked to make this speech. If you had known me back in grade school, seeing me up here is the ultimate plot twist. I hate to admit this, but I was bored and hungry at my own grade school graduation. I couldn't wait for my turn to go up the stage, shake the important people's hands, and be done with it. I wanted the ceremony to be over so I could celebrate with my family at Shakey's Katipunan. The yummy spaghetti and thin-crust pizza overflowing with cheese and topped with lots of mushrooms were all I could think of. And now, I'm here before you, doing the very thing in the graduation program that younger Gail slept on. So, I think you'll agree that for me, this speaking gig is a major glow-up. An upgrade. A change. You'll soon enter a phase in your life that's all about changes. Physical changes. Emotional changes. Changes at home and in school. Changes in your relationships with family and friends. Everything is changing and will change even more, for better or for worse. Sounds scary? Well, I'm not going to sugarcoat it and say that it isn't. Because it is. Change is scary. But here's another plot twist: you're going to be okay. Because you managed to get here. In this auditorium, at this very moment, graduating. You persevered. And you'll do it again, this persevering. Because even when we're embracing change, we need to keep pushing forward, keep dreaming our dreams.

I remember when I first started grade school. Everyone in my class already knew how to read... Everyone except me. I had a hard time catching up. But thankfully, my mom and my grandmother came up with a way to tap into my imagination and helped me associate images with words. Once I entered the world of stories, I was hooked. I fell in love with the magic of words. Still, I didn't fail to notice that none of the stories I read featured someone who looked like me. So, I promised myself, I would become a writer one day. Or an artist. Or maybe even both. Either way, I wanted my works to tell the stories of dark-skinned, flat-nosed Filipino girls like me.

You see, I've always believed that we all have a story to tell. A tale unique to each and every one of us. A truth that only we can share to the world. I wanted to tell my truth, but I was too afraid to show anyone my work, especially my writing. I worried they might think my tales weren't worth listening to. That my truths didn't really matter as much as I thought they did.

So, I kept these stories to myself. I did my best to fit in. I made a lot of friends. I joined the basketball varsity team and became good at the sport. I ran the 50-meter dash for the MCGS track and field team. Thanks to my super-secret writing habit and summer art workshops at home with my creative mother, I always got good grades in Art, Reading, and Filipino without even trying. I couldn't wait to graduate with a bang. Then, in the last quarter of my last year in grade school, I had a huge falling out with one of my friends. A bunch of kids I used to be friendly with suddenly just ignored me. I learned the hard way who my real friends were. But still, going to class wasn't as fun as before.

Back home, I poured my feelings into my writing and art. I was getting better and better at my craft without even knowing it. Well, that was, until my homeroom and Filipino teacher, Mrs. Nida Tamidles, reached out to my mother.



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Mrs. Tamidles told my mom that I was talented in the use of words, and recommended she encourage me to keep honing my reading and writing skills. I held on to Mrs. Tamidles' compliment like a talisman all the way to graduation day. A teacher I loved and respected thought I was great writer! Maybe there was a chance I could become a published author, after all. Maybe one day I could actually walk into National Bookstore Katipunan and see a book I wrote on their shelves. Maybe it was possible for my dreams to come true.

So, you see, I was unfazed during my graduation because I knew there were more life adventures that awaited me after the ceremony. And, of course, there was still the yummy lunch of pizza and spaghetti I was looking forward to. Soon after, my mom bought me all the books I wanted to read and notebooks I wanted to write on. She even let me use our computer (yep, computers already existed back then). I read and read. I wrote and wrote more. Still, I didn't just yeet myself to the finish line. I encountered challenges and even more changes along the way. I needed to hurdle these obstacles that eventually changed me. I became stronger. I learned to pick myself up in the face of failure. I got wiser. I changed and became a better me.

After some time, the web design company I started with my husband turned into a thriving business. Then I got into blogging, and founded the first-ever Philippine Blog Awards, a nationwide award-giving body that gave recognition to our country's best bloggers. I eventually returned to fiction-writing and published my debut novel in 2019. I've been writing books for kids like you since then. And yes, I visited National Bookstore Katipunan when I had the chance. I saw my book and held my tears so the bookstore people wouldn't think I was being weird. Sometimes I wonder if I would have made the same decisions had I not been a Better Me. Would I have had the courage to submit my work to literary agents and not give up until after 72 rejections? Would I have gotten into mentoring aspiring authors when I had a difficult time getting published myself? Would I have written my books as a mirror for brown Filipino girls and a window for other kids all over the world? Maybe I still would have accomplished these things. Or maybe it'll be another plot twist and I wouldn't have. I don't really know.One thing I am sure of though, is that the better versions of our selves not only have the capacity to accept change but will also strive to usher positive change in the lives of others in their own little way.

Changes are bound to happen, so welcome the changes you will face. Embrace them freely. But do so while staying true to your convictions. Before long, you will find yourself becoming a better version of yourself too.

It's not going to be easy. Bettering yourself with every new challenge will likely become more difficult as you grow older. But you are Maryknollers, the Maria Katipuneras. You have love guiding your hearts, truth and justice inspiring your minds, and God's everlasting light shepherding your souls. Believe in yourself. Speak your truths, while uplifting those whose voices our society refuses to hear. And always, always keep your faith in the Lord.

I am also in the presence of individuals who are reliable and respectful; and vocal when they need to be. Both independent, can do things on their own and humble enough to know when to ask for help. These are all great qualities that show your character as human beings. Character, as you move through life, is valuable. Protect it, build it, and hone it.

Batch 2024, thank you for sharing with me your time and attention today. Today, I will leave you with 2 valuable lessons.

Lesson #1: It is a gift to reflect

To be completely honest, I found it a little difficult putting this speech together. I lost my grandfather a couple of days ago and we said our final goodbyes to him yesterday. It's been difficult. For days, I've been contemplating change, loss, grief, legacy, and purpose. The questions in my head ask:

Paano ko masasabi na nabuhay ako ng tama? May tama bang paraan ng pamumuhay? What is my purpose in life? Can my purpose change? Which path is the right one?



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How can I make a difference?

What can I do to make sure that everything that I want to happen, will happen?

These are the questions you may have asked at least once in your journey transitioning into a new life stage. I want you to know that it's okay to ask these questions. It is a gift to ask. It is a gift to reflect.

In your journey from here on out, you will face many crossroads, redirections, and roadblocks that will prompt you to pause. To pause allows us space to breathe. Rejections, missed opportunities, change of plans, change in characters are all part of the story we're creating called 'life'. These bumps on the road are opportunities for us to reflect; and the older you get, the more resources you'll have in the form of experience and mentors that will help you decide.

You can rest easy knowing that you have been introduced to core values like Truth, Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation– values you can ground your thoughts and actions on as graduates of this esteemed institute. You have also been prepared and shaped to be lifelong learners, embracing your humanity as fallible individuals. Because we're human, we will make mistakes. Mistakes are inevitable. You will make wrong decisions. You will hurt people, unintentionally. You will make the mistake of choosing safety over growth. You will stay in places that you've outgrown cause you're scared of being outside your comfort zone. That's okay. Remember, the presence of fear is not the absence of capability. You will fall short on a promise. You will fail. These are all part of being human. Because we're human, we will make mistakes. But there's a reason why you are here today, graduating, moving into a new life stage. It's because you are capable. To be human is to be capable while being vulnerable. We don't know what tomorrow holds. We don't have all the answers. Even at 30,40, 50 years of age, we're all still figuring it out.

Gusto man natin alamin ang lahat. Hindi nasa sa atin para alamin ang lahat. Nasa sa Kanya. When I ponder on life once more, I realize that maybe it's not about having all the answers; but it's about not knowing and trusting anyway. Trusting ourselves that we are capable of weathering the seasons that will come our way; and trusting that the Good Lord will be with us every step of the way.

Lesson #2: Trust, surrender, try, and try again

My story is a story of trust. As you know, I'm a football player. I've been playing football for almost 20 years. I've been representing the country for 15 years. I was 11 years old when I started representing the country at the club level and then later went on to represent at the national team level.



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I've had the immense honor these past 3 years to help our country qualify into and prepare for our first ever FIFA Women's World Cup. Kaming Filipinas ang kauna-unang koponan na nakakamit ng karangalan na ito. Pasok na ang Pilipinas sa pinakamalaking kompetisyon sa mundo. What an honor.

To play in the World Cup is the dream of every footballer. I can say with my whole being that it was my dream and my life for 2 whole years. My other teammates who grew up in the United States share that it's been their dream since they were kids. I can't say the same for myself because when I was younger, the World Cup dream felt so far away. I couldn't dream it cause I couldn't see it. I didn't know it was possible that I, a Filipina, would come close to ever playing in that tournament. But when we finally came close to achieving it, the dream was planted in my heart and I put my head down and worked. Tiwala lang, sabi ko sa sarili ko. Trust.

From April 2021 til April 2023, I worked extremely hard to give myself the best possible chance to play in the World Cup. I was there from the start. I was part of the team that started training at the height of the pandemic in the Philippines when we had to navigate online distance learning, April 2021. I was also part of the team who got to travel around the world for 12 months to train in international camps to help us become the most prepared team entering the tournament.

I wanted to achieve my goal of playing in the World Cup so badly; but just a handful of months before the actual tournament, I got cut from the team. To this day, that experience stands to be one of the most painful events I've ever had to experience in my life.

What now? Tiwala lang parin ba?

In life to come, you will encounter huge redirections. Not getting into your dream school. Dream course. Dream company. Let me be a testament that you can chase your dreams, fail, and still be okay.

Batch 2024, learn to surrender. Sometimes, you don't get what you want because something even bigger and better is being prepared for you. After I got cut from the team, I surrendered to the Lord. So why did I say this, because in the real world, while we have different professions, we are dealing with different types of people as well, in different industries: academe, regulators, commerce and industry and even in public practice. And while I graduated in BS Accountancy and I am working in Public Practice, I would like to share with you some suggestions based on my experiences, in career and in life which you may use regardless of your course.

1. Invest in yourself. Work with a purpose.

As a newly graduate, you will experience that salary will probably start low while the demand in your work will be high. Sometimes, you are required to render overtime work and you might feel that it is not reasonable. When it happens, in the early part of your career, please remember that every exceeded hours that you rendered in your work is an investment for you to hone your respective craft. And eventually, you will see the benefits of those investments in the future when you are already a decision maker in your chosen career, so invest in yourself.

2. Choose your own path.

When you land on a job on early years, it is nice as some of you will be accepted in the same Company (e.g. Audit, Private Company, Academe, Government). But as time pass by, most of your classmates turned officemates, will soon leave the Company, probably because they have different priorities (e.g. going on separate field, do further study, etc.), so instead of putting pressure to yourself and comparing yourself to others, do what you prefer – decide on your own.

3. Be resilient.

Challenges will always be there.. as well as the accomplishments, one must just not give up. One of the misconceptions in public practice, given that we have busy season, is that we have sleepless nights, we do mostly work, and we don't have work-life balance. In my work as an external auditor, where I get to work with different clients in different industries, I was able to confirm that regardless of the profession, there will always be challenges: month-end closing for private firm, tests and modules for academe, rules and regulations for government and busy season for us, in public practice. So be resilient, challenges will end and success will be achieved for those who do not give up, so be resilient.



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4. Widen your network.

Networking is very important to thrive in your chosen career. As a guide, in every industry and in every profession, there are already established organizations. In my case for example, we have the Philippine Institute of Certified Public Accountants or what we call PICPA. Any organizations connected to your specializations and interests is a great place to start. Why? Because there are already a lot of successful and established people in that organization which can guide you and mentor you as well. I realized that successful people like to see others become successful to, they are willing to help, you just need to ask them.

5. Generation Gap.

There will always, always be generation gap because the world is evolving. In our industry in public practice, it is the first place where accountancy students apply, whether its their choice or just the norm. Generation today is very good in technology and wants empathy. While earlier generation are known to be structured and resilient. And that is okay. But instead of trying to insist on closing the gap, and change the belief of different generation, use each other's strength instead and help with each other's weaknesses. If you learn to tolerate, it will be a win-win situation.

6. Give back to the community.

It always a great feeling when you succeed in your career but it there is immeasurable satisfaction and happiness when you can give back to the community as well. In our Company and Organization, I was mostly assign to Community Social Responsibility. This includes visiting and donating to cancer patients, donation drive to schools on remote areas, tree planting, feeding program to children and many more. When you can, I encourage you join this type of activities. It will bring good to you, as well as inner peace.

7. Integrity and values above all.

Always do the right thing. Imagine that you will build your career and with just the snap, with just one action that you compromise your values, it can all go to waste. Money can be replaced, but it's hard to rebuild a tarnish reputation.

8. Treasure your health.

I need not elaborate this one. To enjoy what we achieve, we need to take care of our health.

9. Be grateful to the people who helped you achieve where you are right now.

Such as your parents, relatives, teachers and others who mentored and assisted you to be able to achieve were you are right now.
