UNVEILING CEREMONY OF THE ASI MARYKNOLL MARKER

Last November 23, Miriam College (MC) unveiled its third historical marker at the Asian Social Institute (ASI) in Malate, Metro Manila. The Unveiling ceremony of the Maryknoll marker commemorates the rich history and heartfelt contributions of the Maryknoll High School Class of 1964.



This event, held in partnership with the Asian Social Institute, was attended by the alumnae of the Maryknoll High School Class of 1964, members of the Miriam College community, and the Asian Social Institute. To also honor the experiences and histories shared within Maryknoll College, a mini-exhibit on the Maryknoll Sisters, and their legacy at ASI alongside photographs of the alumnae on the campus was open throughout the day.



The program began with a holy mass, setting the reverent tone for the day led by Fr. Aung KoKo. Following the mass, the program facilitated by Ms. Jann Erin Castro transitioned into messages that celebrated the school's history and looked ahead to its future. Alumni, faculty, and partners shared their reflections and messages of gratitude and nostalgia.

Miriam College President, Amb. Laura Quiambao-Del Rosario thanked the MC High School batch 1964 for their generosity and dedication to the MC community. Amb. Del Rosario also brushed through the journey of Miriam College and the historical heritage it witnessed as reflected by the campus' location's historical context.







She also shed light on the future outlook of the MC community, such as the opening of a third campus in Alviera, Pampanga, and plans to take over the Maryknoll Ecological Sanctuary in Baguio, paving the way for Miriam College to continue its development and legacy, setting the stage for its 100thanniversary celebration in 2026.

ASI expressed heartfelt gratitude for its collaboration and partnership with the MC Community over the years through messages from Dr. Felipe M. De Leon, ASI President, and Dr. Mina M. Ramirez, ASI President Emerita.

Dr. De Leon emphasized the spiritual and academic bond between ASI and MC, strengthened further by both institutes' shared values in promoting peace and social justice.

Dr. Ramirez further reflected on the shared mission to empower communities and promote environmental stewardship, through education and social development. She also mentioned the collaborative efforts of Maryknoll fathers and sisters, and the influence of the partnership in instigating social action.

To represent the Maryknoll High School Class of 1964, Ms. Imelda Perez Lopez gave a message highlighting her years of experience at Maryknoll College. Ms. Lopez revisited her nostalgic memories and challenges during her youth and how she continues to carry the values of discipline, good manners, and humility thanks to the guidance of her former nun teachers.













She touched on how the marker represents the shared fond memories under Maryknoll College, ending with the note "This school marker will keep our personal and collective memory of Maryknoll College alive."

The ceremony concluded with the official unveiling and blessing of the 3rd marker College. The marker of the Miriam the contribution of the represents Maryknoll College Alumnae in upholding the MC values as they dedicate this to their time of growth within the Maryknoll College formerly located within the site of the ASI along the roads of Pennsylvania Street, now known as Leon Guinto, St.

CELEBRATING THE MARYKNOLL-MIRIAM LEGACY: A SHARED HISTORY OF SERVICE

Miriam College High School Class of 1995 initiated efforts to explore a possible collaboration between Miriam College (MC) and Cardinal Santos Medical Center (CSMC) to honor their shared roots and transformative recognize the impact of the Maryknoll Sisters in the Philippines. As institutions that were profoundly shaped by the vision and mission of the Maryknoll Sisters, both MC and CSMC aim to celebrate this legacy of selfless service, compassion, and dedication to nation-building.

The Maryknoll Sisters, known for their missionary work, arrived in the Philippines in 1925 and dedicated themselves to the healthcare, education and social service of the Filipino people. In 1926, they laid the foundations for Maryknoll College (now Miriam College), fostering transformative education that uplifts women to become leaders in society. In 1927, Archbishop Michael O'Doherty turned over the St. Paul's Hospital of Manila to the sisters.

The hospital was destroyed during World War II. A partnership between the Archdiocese of Manila and the Maryknoll sisters was resumed in the 1960's leading to the construction of the new hospital in Greenhills. In 1968, Sr. Maura Shaun turned over co-ownership and administration of St. Paul's hospital to the Archdiocese of Manila and was later renamed Cardinal Santos Memorial Hospital. The enduring legacy of the Maryknoll sisters continues to inspire MC and CSMC in their pursuit of excellence in education and healthcare.

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Thus, on October 3, 2024, representatives of MCHS Class of 1995, namely, Ms. Lourdes Espiritu, Ms. Michelle Reyes-Navarro, Ms. Leah Czarina Guevarra, Ms. Sofia Soledad De Guzman, Dr. Kristine Marie Lesaca-Saludez, with Maryknoll-Miriam College Alumni Association Director, Dr. Ma. Margarita Acosta and the College President, Ambassador Laura Q. Del Rosario, visited CSMC. They were warmly welcomed by the officials of CSMC headed by its president, Mr. Raul C. Pagdanganan.

In recognition of this shared heritage, MC and CSMC are preparing to sign a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) that will formalize their collaboration. This partnership underscores their common commitment that echoes the Maryknoll Sisters' mission. The agreement will include possible benefits for alumni and faculty including an installation of a stone marker at the hospital. MCHS Class of 1995 will sponsor all costs related to the installation of the said marker.

This historic collaboration reaffirms the lasting influence of the Maryknoll Sisters and highlights the power of collective action in advancing the greater good. Together, Miriam College, through its alumni, and Cardinal Santos Medical Center aim to inspire future generations to uphold the principles of service, integrity, generosity, and leadership that the Maryknoll Sisters embodied.

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more than 400 exemplary datasets and evidence-based programs that bridge research with real-world applications. *



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CHI RHO PUBLICATIONS INTERVIEWS MS. ALICE REYES

Chi Rho Publications held a short interview with Ms. Alice Reyes at the Manila Metropolitan Theater last October 18, 2024 to explore her journey from Maryknoll College (now Miriam College) to her path to becoming a national artist.

From MC Pride to National Artist:

As a Filipina dancer, choreographer, teacher, art director, and producer who pioneered the first modern dance concert at the Cultural Center of the Philippines in 1970, Ms. Alice Reyes has earned the title of the Mother of Contemporary Dance through her efforts to elevate and professionalize contemporary dance as a recognized art form in the Philippines. Her notable works include Rama Hari, Cinderella, and Itim-Asu—which all have significance to Filipino culture, gesture, and grace—established her remarkable career as a performing artist. In 2014, her contributions to the progress of Philippine dance were finally recognized as she received the highest award for arts as the National Artist for Dance from the late Philippine President Benigno Aquino III.





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In 1969, Ms. Reyes established the Modern Dance Company, now known as Ballet Philippines-the country's most renowned and longest-running professional company-aiming dance to solidify dance as a recognized profession.

"The fact that Filipinos are such naturally talented dancers... I thought it was time for Filipinos to have the opportunity to have a career in dance as professional dancers, but that was the first step and we were the first ones to do that," Ms. Reyes said.

More than a National Artist for Dance-Alice Ms Reyes is a living embodiment of the art itself.

After her recognition as a National Artist for Dance in 2014, Ms. Alice Reyes maintains that her life as an artist, or even as an individual, has not changed. She remains to be the same person who is passionate about everything she does for art. While such tremendous honor has given her some unique advantages, Ms. Reyes believes that the title is not the only thing that defines her as an artist.



"If I weren't a National Artist, my sharings, comments, and thoughts would be as viable because of my 70 years in dance, so it's really a matter of how you, the other person, see that award," she said.

Her decades of experience, the amount of notable work she has produced, and her unwavering advocacy for aspiring Filipino dancers have elevated her beyond the title of National Artist-defining her as a living embodiment of the art itself.

Trailblazers in Habits

Reflecting on her education at Miriam College, Ms. Reyes credits the institution as the foundation of her success. From her grade school years through earning a bachelor's degree in AB History and Foreign Service, Maryknoll's unique educational approach instilled in her the discipline, confidence, and passion that shaped her artistry and leadership. Ms. Reyes highlighted the school's balance of intellectual rigor and moral guidance as pivotal in her growth.

"This whole approach that I learned from Maryknoll-Miriam is still happening, and that's the beauty of that vision of the missionaries," Ms. Reyes said. She emphasized how the nuns' commitment to empowering young women through education inspired her to follow her dreams. According to Ms. Reyes, Maryknoll's nurturing environment taught her to embrace her talents and use them to serve the community—values she carried throughout her career.



It was this foundation at Maryknoll College that prepared Ms. Reyes to thrive on the international stage and return to the Philippines as a trailblazer, transforming the landscape of Filipino dance.
